# Prayer of Confession


Generous God, whose giving knows neither measure nor end, we confess that all too often we have kept our own hearts, hands, and minds firmly closed.

# HEARING THE WORD

SCRIPTURE LESSON Luke 9:10-17

On their return the apostles told Jesus all they had done. He took them with him and withdrew privately to a city called Bethsaida. When the crowds found out about it, they followed him; and he welcomed them, and spoke to them about the kingdom of God, and healed those who needed to be cured.

The day was drawing to a close, and the twelve came to him and said, "Send the crowd away, so that they may go into the surrounding villages and countryside, to lodge and get provisions; for we are here in a deserted place." But he said to them, "You give them something to eat." They said, "We have no more than five loaves and two fish—unless we are to go and buy food for all these people." For

there were about five thousand men. And he said to his disciples, "Make them sit down in groups of about fifty each." They did so and made them all sit down. And taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven, and blessed and broke them, and gave them to the disciples to set before the crowd. And all ate and were filled. What was left over was gathered up, twelve baskets of broken pieces.

AFFIRMATION OF FAITH from the Presbyterian Confession of 1967 The reconciliation of humankind through Jesus Christ makes it plain that enslaving poverty in a world of abundance is an intolerable violation of God's good creation. A church that is indifferent to poverty, or evades responsibility in economic affairs, or is open to one social class only, or expects gratitude for its beneficence makes a mockery of reconciliation and

#### Constitutional Questions for Elders, Deacons, and Trustees

- 3. Do you sincerely receive and adopt the essential tenets of the Reformed faith as expressed in the confessions of our church as authentic and reliable expositions of what Scripture leads us to believe and do, and will you be instructed and led by those confessions as you lead the people of God?
- 4. Will you fulfill your ministry in obedience to Jesus Christ, under the authority of Scripture, and be continually guided by our confessions?
- 5. Will you be governed by our church's polity, and will you abide by its discipline? Will you be a friend among your colleagues in ministry, working with them subject to the ordering of God's Word and Spirit?
- 6. Will you in your own life seek to follow the Lord Jesus Christ, love your neighbors, and work for the reconciliation of the world?
- 7. Do you promise to further peace, unity, and purity of the church?
- 8. Will you pray for and seek to serve the people with energy, intelligence, imagination, and love?

For deacons: Will you be a faithful deacon, teaching charity, urging concern, and directing the people's help to the friendless and those in need, and in your ministry will you try to show the love and justice of Jesus Christ?

For elders: Will you be a faithful ruling elder, watching over the people, providing for their worship, nurture, and service? Will you share in government and discipline, serving in councils of the church, and in your ministry will you try to show the love and justice of Jesus Christ?

For trustees: Will you be a faithful trustee, serving as a faithful steward of the gifts of God through this congregation, and in your ministry will you try to show the love and justice of Jesus Christ?

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MUSIC NOTES Robert A. Harris (b. 1938) is a Professor Emeritus at Northwestern University's Bienen School of Music, and serves as Director of Music and Choirmaster at the Winnetka Congregational Church in Winnetka, IL. Dr. Harris was Professor of Conducting and Director of Choral Organizations at Northwestern from 1977 to 2012. As a composer, Dr. Harris has been the recipient of over forty commissions from schools, churches and musical organizations. An interview of Harris is part of the History Makers Collection—the nation's largest African-American video oral history collection—at the Library of Congress in Washington, DC. "Solemn Processional" was composed for a wedding service in 1985. • Contemporary English composer Bob Chilcott (b. 1955) has been involved with music all his life, first as a Chorister and then a Choral Scholar at King's College, Cambridge. Later, he sang and composed music for 12 years with the King's Singers. His experiences with that group, his passionate commitment to young and amateur choirs, and his profound belief that music can unite people, have inspired him both to compose full-time and promote choral music worldwide. "Sun Dance" is an adaption of the vibrant final movement of Chilcott's Organ Dances for organ, percussion, and strings, composed in 1996.

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
